


Some Background on the WASP and the WASP Museum

- The Women Airforce Service Pilots were est. during WWII to carry out non-combat flying duties, stateside.
- Duties included everything from ferrying aircraft to pilot/crew training and helping with advanced combat training.
- The vast majority of them trained at Avenger Field in Sweetwater
- In 2005, a museum was established to honor those women
- I became involved with the museum in 2022 and one of the things I
 was asked to help with was the landscaping.





When the Museum added a second building.

They hired a local landscaping company to give them a "low maintenance" landscape.

This was all planted in the fall of 2020







The Orange oval:

- red yuccas
- Knock Out roses

Yellow circles:

Mexican feather grass



Dry creek bed created in the existing gully.

Rocks arranged to direct water coming into the creek bed.

Some terracing in the planting bed.





Planted Frogfruit

- native groundcover.
- helps hold the soil
- works as green mulch.
- host plant for butterflies
- provides nectar
- needs very little water
- can handle full, all-day, Texas sun.



Poor soil was another problem


The previous landscapers used the existing dirt.

Fill dirt used to create the foundation for the new building: think heavy clay.

I did amend some, but since I was planning on using native plants, I didn't want it to be too rich.

The plan was to use mulch. But then we discovered the next problem...







The WIND

The Mulch Challenge:
Pine bark mulch – blew away
Cypress mulch – blew away
Decomposed granite – blew away

Other problem: blew smaller plants right out of the soil.

Upside: Wildflower seeds blow in, but also weed and grass seeds





My Philosophy:

- A weed is just a plant that is in the wrong place.
- If it gives me a pretty flower, its NOT a weed.
- If it is non-native and invasive. It's a weed.
- If it has stickers or burrs. It's a weed.
- If you want to successfully garden for pollinators and wildlife, your garden needs to be messy.




















The Human Factor

- Herbicides blow in the wind.
